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## St. Joseph's community dedicates new mosaic mural

Students, staff and volunteers gathered at St. Joseph Catholic School Monday for the dedication of a one-of-akind mosaic mural.

Recognized were the people who contributed their time and talents to the Fort Atkinson mural, which includes themes centered on a strong image of Jesus as a Biblical storyteller.


Sally Koehler, local art teacher and chair of the St. Joseph School Art Enrichment Committee, said a variety of individuals contributed to working on the project, some of whom put in 12-, 13- and 14-hour days. There were various jobs for each person who helped, including placing the tiles, cleaning the surface and grouting it.

"It just was a really fantastic group effort of combining the parish, the school, teachers, staff and alumni," she said. "It's just been an amazing experience."

Joshua Winer, this year's artist-in-residence, led brainstorming sessions with students in October. Imaginative ideas for the mural's theme surfaced from these gatherings, with a few images surfacing again and again. The selection of the mosaic theme was chosen by the school's students, staff and parents.

"Working together steadily for a week, we have created a work of art that will shine on the wall of the school for many years," Winer said. "Each of us has been a special part of this mosaic, and like the many small pieces of tile that together form the overall picture, our individual efforts are united into a shared community experience of building a work of art that is filled with beauty and meaning."

Students created concept drawings and detailed sketches for Winer. Using elements from these materials, he created one cohesive drawing that served as the "blueprint" for the mosaic.

"(Winer) directed the whole thing beautifully," Koehler said. "He knew what the next plan was and kept the kids working at age appropriate activities. He was fantastic to work with. I would do another project with him in a heartbeat."

Students first molded clay into fish and other sea creatures that appear throughout the piece. They also created some of the raw materials for the mosaic by glazing tiles and fragmenting them once fired.

Every student, from 4-year-old kindergartners through pupils in eighth grade, was given an opportunity to participate in hands-on time crafting the mosaic mural. Families, parish members and alumni also were invited to work on the mosaic during optional evening and weekend sessions.

School principal David Podmolik said there are a lot of aspects to the mural that are beneficial.

"I am very pleased that everything about it includes a part of our mission," he said. "The faith aspect is there, but it also has given kids who maybe aren't really key on art a chance to contribute what they are skilled in such as math, engineering or something else."

During the dedication ceremony Monday afternoon, Koehler made time to thank the individuals who contributed supplies, time, services or money. Podmolik said he is excited to have the work of art in their entryway, because it will give the school a kind of identity it did not have before.

"I'm thrilled to death that this new building is going to finally look like it's a Catholic school, and it's going to help seal an identity," he said.
